Australian Business and Community Network

This term a group of year 7 students have had the opportunity to travel to Brisbane to participate in an Australian Business and Community Network (ABCN) program. The program provided opportunities for our students to engage and build confidence in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) workshops working along side current business mentors to build an understanding and awareness of STEM Careers.

STEM jobs are growing significantly faster than any other jobs.

The program involved small groups of students working with mentors over four, fully facilitated sessions to apply skills such as creativity, innovation and problem solving. During the workshops students worked in small groups building skills to work and thrive in the twenty-first century. Discussions were centred around the pace at which industries are changing and that new jobs and organisations are being established all the time along with the twenty-first century skills that future employees will require. Students were able to practise being creative and designing solutions and completing challenges alongside real-world experienced mentors.

All students have thoroughly enjoyed the experience they have been offered and it has inspired in them an even greater passion for learning, particularly in the field of STEM. All students have been outstanding ambassadors for Bundamba State Secondary College.



Year 9

Junior Education and Targets Planning

Throughout the year, the focus of the year 9 Bundamba Care Class (BCC) program has been Career Education to lead up to our successful first ever JET planning day. JET, or Junior Education and Targets Planning provides an opportunity for our year 9 students and their families to meet with a year 9 Care Class teacher and Year Coordinator or Head of Year, to review the student's progress in their secondary school journey to date and identify future pathways. JET planning is undertaken at Bundamba SSC to provide an opportunity for students and their families to set realistic academic, effort and behaviour goals to set them up to be successful as they transition out of the Junior Secondary and into their Senior Secondary phase of their education. The students can also choose their year 10 electives and ensure that their subject choices line up with their proposed Senior Secondary pathway.

To Get Set for JET, our BSSC JET planning day in Term 3, students spent their Term 2 and 3 Thursday BCC lessons engaging in a wide variety of activities including:

- UQ presentation "Finding Your Future";
- Classroom activities to learn about all the Senior Schooling terms including QCE, ATAR, General and Applied Subjects, TAFE, VET and traineeships, and BSSC Senior Pathways: Green, Mint and White
- Classroom activities to investigate career options using www.myfuture.edu.au
- Reviewing their academic grades using TrackEd sheets and how to set SMART goals
- Head of Department year 10 subject talks;
- Head of Senior Schooling talk about Bundamba SSC Pathways;
- BLO Candice Ferrier talk about TAFE, Apprenticeships, Traineeships and Work experience options:
- Attend the 2022 Bundamba SSC Career Expo

Term 4 care class activities have included a block of lessons focusing on the development of academic learning behaviours essential for survival in the senior secondary phase including Motivation, Discipline, Time Management (presented by external provider Elevate) and Persistence and Resilience.

For the remaining part of Term 4, students will take part in a rotation of practical activities to develop their skills to work in teams, solve problems together, improve their communication and develop leadership.

The activities presented by the year 9 Care Class teachers include a variety of sports, mindfulness, board games and gardening.

Mertal Health Week

We celebrated Mental Health Week at BSSC between the 8th-16th of October where students and staff participated in activities that encouraged awareness, belonging and connection.
